



Sustainable living for a simple life

It is possible to lead a satisfying life using minimum energy

I live in Phaltan, a small town in Satara, and run an NGO called Nimbkar Agricultural Research Institute (NARI).

We work in areas of agriculture, renewable energy, animal husbandry and sustainable development. Since I work on sustainable developmental issues, I also try to live sustainably. I would, therefore, like to share my experience of living a sustainable, but intellectually and emotionally-satisfying life.

I live in a house designed by me. It is built of stone with 18" thick walls that allow tremendous thermal lag-time, so that heating and cooling due to ambient atmospheric temperature is delayed. It is passively cooled in the summer by laying old wet gunny bags on the roof.

The evaporating water from the bags cools the roof and takes away 80% of the thermal load entering the house. Thus, when the temperature outside is about 40-45°C, the house is cool with the average temperature of the rooms ranging from 25-30°C in the afternoon. The trees surrounding the house also help.

The old gunny sacs are either used as mulch in the garden or burned in our hot water boiler. The boiler is a grate-type multi-fuel boiler with a 10-metre chimney attached to it. The ash from this boiler is used as fertilizer.

All our kitchen waste is fed to our rabbits (about 25-30 of them). These rabbits produce fertilizer (droppings) that makes excellent manure for the garden. All other

items inedible for the rabbits, like egg shells or tea waste, are put in the compost pit. After every two or three months, the output from this pit is used as fertilizer.

Our house is on a two-acre plot that has a lot of trees. Their leaf litter rots in the soil during the rainy season and provides mulch. The dead branches of trees provide wood for heating our bath water in the boiler. When we bought this land in 1981, it was completely barren and its quality was poor. Today, the leaf litter and the compost fertilizer have improved the soil quality immensely. The soil is now springy and quite fertile.

Most of our vegetables are grown within 10-15 km from our home. The eggs are from free ranging chickens, milk from cows across the road. We use safflower seed produced in our institute farm for oil. Thus, the oil is fresh and without chemicals.

FOR A BETTER FUTURE

We get most of our groceries and vegetables in cotton carry bags. I usually drive my Maruti 800 car. It gives me between 13-16 km/litre and is small enough to go in the lanes and bylanes of Phaltan. For long distance travel, I use a Maruti Esteem that gives me 18-20 km/litre.

I wear khadi or cotton-spun clothes made in cottage industries. Khadi is a comfortable material to wear and it makes for excellent dusters and wipers later. After they become tattered, they are used in the boiler to heat water. Similarly, all the papers in office are used on both sides. They are then brought home to again heat the water. Thus, everything is recycled.

We use electricity sparingly and this is facilitated by the state gov-

ernment with the 7-8 hours of power cuts every day. We have battery-powered inverters, both in the offices and at home, which supply enough juice for the lights and fans. So the television or refrigerator does not run on them. Power cuts are a good time to read and discuss.

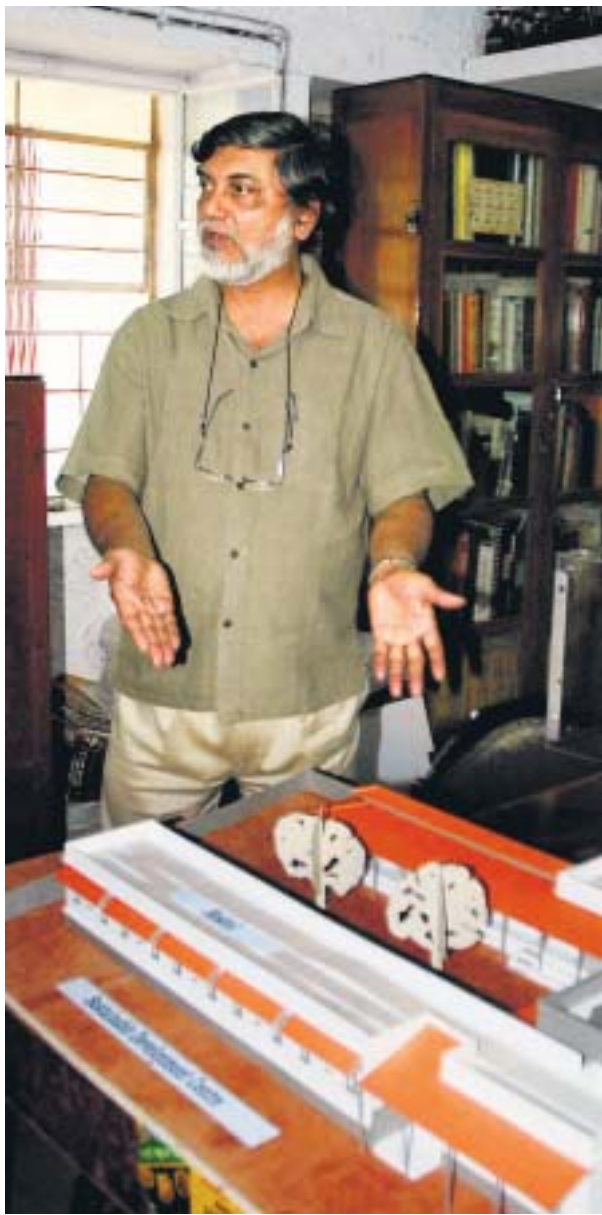
We do not travel much, but communicate via phones of the Internet. I believe this is a more energy-efficient way of keeping in touch. On an average, we travel only 15,000 km/yr; thus very low energy is used for transport.

We buy only things that are needed. One of our TV sets is 25-30 years old. Most of our gadgets are repaired when they stop working rather than being thrown away.

There is hardly any electricity consumption since we use only fans and CFLs and almost no air conditioning. Our offices also have evaporative roof cooling.

Thus, a very satisfying and decent lifestyle can be maintained using less energy and water as compared to that in western societies. This is a lesson for our leaders who are hell-bent on following the Chinese and US patterns, both of which are consumptive and unsustainable.

Why should we be in such desperate haste to succeed and in such desperate enterprises? If a man does not keep pace with his companions, perhaps it is because he hears a different drummer. Let him step to the music he hears, however measured or far away.
